Bryn Mawr, Neighbors and Regency scored the highest in the last two months ranging from 4.85-5.00. Five facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Dining

Bryn Mawr, Greenwood and Rock Island scored the highest ranging from 4.57-5.00. Three of the twelve facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Food

Decatur and Greenwood Care scored the highest with 4.33-5.00. Five of the twelve facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Cleanliness

Bryn Mawr and Regency ranked the highest 4.80-5.00 Four facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Individual Needs

Neighbors did the best the last two month with a score of 4.75-4.80. Four facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Laundry

Bryn Mawr, Greenwood Care and Neighbors scored perfect scores of 5.00 the last two months. Five facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Communication

Greenwood Care, Neighbors and Wilson Care scored perfect scores of 5.00. Six facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Response/Problems

Regency and Rock Island scored the highest with 4.57-5.00. Five of the twelve facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Dignity

Greenwood Care, Neighbors and Rock Island scored perfect scores of 5.00 the last two months. Eight facilities met or exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

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Recommend Facility

Greenwood Care and Rock Island scored the highest with 4.57-5.00 the last two months. Six facilities met or exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Activities

Greenwood Care, Maplewood Care and Regency scored the highest ranging from 4.83-5.00 the last two months. Four facilities have met and exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Therapy

Elmwood Care and Neighbors scored the highest with 4.67-4.80. Three facilities met or exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Admissions

Rock Island scored the highest score with 4.60 two months consecutively. Seven of the twelve facilities met or exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Safety

Greenwood Care, Rock Island and Wilson Care scored 4.83-5.00 the last two months. Five facilities exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Overall Average

Decatur and Rock Island scored 4.60-5.00. Five of the twelve facilities met or exceeded Best In Class averages in 2010.

Spring Crafts

Make these charming tin can herb pots and watch them grow all summer long!

What you'll need:

Empty aluminum can, screwdriver and hammer, liquid gesso (recommended: Liquitex Basics Gesso), acrylic craft paints in colors of your choice, acrylic sealer spray, matte finish, craft stick, thin cardboard, pinking shears, black permanent marker, 5-10 small rocks, stones or pebbles, 1.5 cups potting soil, 4-inch potted herb plant, white craft glue, Water, flower stickers (optional)

How to make it:

- **1.** Completely wash and dry aluminum can. If necessary, sand off any rough edges from opening of can.
- **2.** Turn can upside down. Parent should use screwdriver or other pointed object to poke holes in the bottom of the can. Use a hammer to tap the end of the screwdriver to make the holes.
- 3. Paint outside of can with one coat of gesso. Let dry completely.
- 4. Paint can in the desired color, repeat coats if needed.
- **5.** Decorate however you like. Use a thin paint brush for long lines, dip the end of the paint brush into paint for polka dots.
- 6. Decorate with stickers if desired.
- **7.** In a well-ventilated area, spray the outside of the completed can with acrylic sealer spray. Let dry.
- **8.** Place enough rocks or pebbles in the bottom of the can to form a single layer.
- 9. Add enough potting soil to fill the can two-thirds full.
- **10.** Remove potted herb from its container and transplant into the can.
- II. Fill edges with remaining potting soil, gently pat down so that plant is firmly in the can but not compacted so much that it's too tight.
- **12.** Place can on a plate (to catch any water drainage) and add some water to the newly planted herbs.
- 13. Paint craft stick whatever color you like. Allow to dry.
- **14.** Cut a piece of thin cardboard into a small rectangle (about 1.5×3 inches) using pinking shears.
- 15. Paint both side of the cardboard with gesso, let dry.
- **16.** Glue the rectangle to the top of the craft stick.
- **17.** Use a black permanent marker to write the herb name onto the rectangle.
- 18. Insert your plant marker into the soil, being careful not to crush any roots along the way.
- 19. Place your new garden in a sunny window and remember to water them!

Tips:

- A 4-inch potted plant will be enough to make 2-3 vegetable sized cans (15 oz) or one larger tomato sauce type can (28 oz).
- This is a great project to teach kids about growing plants, especially edible ones. Take this opportunity to visit your local library and check out a book on simple container gardening or gardening with kids.
- Keep the kids involved, be sure they take care of "their" plant.
 Have them water their plant and show them how to check to
 see if the soil is too dry or just right by gently touching the
 soil surface with their finger.
- Eat these herbs! Your kids will light up when they get to pinch off a basil leaf to add to your spaghetti sauce.
